Postcard Purchases Feature Beach



A View of Chesapeake Beach, Postmarked July 8, 1909





Fall Family Fun Day

The Museum's first annual Fall Family Fun Day on October 6th proved to be a roaring success. It drew about 300 visitors for a fun-filled afternoon.

Singer Tom Wisner led off the day at 1 p.m. with a round of songs from his latest CD "Made of Water." Pat Nutter followed, donating his time and talents to wow both children and adults with his magic. Afterward, Storyteller Charlotte Smutko told spooky stories in the Dolores. The railcar had been appropriately decorated for Halloween. A grant from the Calvert County Cultural Arts Council and help from the Friends of the CBRM made it possible to bring on the performers.

In between the performances, arts and crafts kept the kids busy. They made magnets that looked like railroad crossing signals. Children also made masks with train faces, as well as the turn-of-the-century cup and ball game. Curator Harriet Stout dressed in her 1912 outfit. Items she took out of "Grandmother's Trunk" showed what people wore to Chesapeake Beach 100 years ago. In addition, visitors had their picture taken in early 20th century attire behind a backboard provided by Tim Scheirer of the Calvert Marine Museum. The backboard was a life-size picture of a family just arrived at the beach. Holes were cut in the faces so anyone could step up and step back into time.



John C. Bosley, Owner And Captain Of The Dreamland

The Museum has a number of photos of the well-known steamboat, The Dreamland, but until recently we had no photo images of the owner and captain, John Cole Bosley. This spring his grandson, John Bosley Yellett, Jr., presented us with a copy of a photo from their family collection.

Some Fisherwoman.

Mrs. Samuel Burleigh Milton, of Washington, D. C., who has a country house at Chesapeake Beach, and who holds old Prince Frederick most dearly to her heart for having been wedded here in 1909, is declared by her friends who have enjoyed the hospitality of "Seyton," the name of her summer home, as some fisherwoman. Mrs. Milton numbers the art of angling among her many outdoor accomplishments. She is an expert swimmer and enjoys the distinction of being the head of the World's Life Saving Alliance for that section of country and during the summer sojourns at Chesapeake Beach. She has been instrumental in going to the rescue and saving at heavy odds the lives of a number of persons from drowning.

Mrs. Milton's latest exploit in the water is related by an eyewitness on the long pier at the Beach, which indicates in a most characteristic manner the courage and intrepid daring of the young society matron, of the Capital. She was fishing at the end of the half-mile pier in nearly twenty fect of water. She got a strike which proved to be a rockfish, but when she pulled it to the top of the water Mr. Rockfish bolted for the piling and in a trice had wound the fish line about the post and broke the line. Repairing the tackle, Mrs. Milton cast again in the same spot and again the "bobber" went down almost out of sight and in less time than it takes to tell it rockfish No. 2 duplicated the trick of his predecessor, but instead of pulling on the line as before, Mrs. Milton astounded the anglers sitting about her on the pier by quickly doffing herskirt, hat and shoes and going overboard after that fish. She swam down alongside the piling to a depth of fully six feet, following the line, until she was able to nab the fish under the gills, release the line and swim up and around to a ladder nailed to the pier for the use of swimmers. When she landed on the pier holding firmly to Mr. Rockfish she was given a hearty cheer for her unique accomplishment. She has proven to be not only a rare fisherwoman but also an expert underwater swimmer. The fish weighed 21 pounds.

Mrs. Milton is regarded as one of the best anglers on the Chesapeake Bay and usually lands the first rockfish of the season. This is her twelfth summer season at her country place, "Seyton."






Visitor Statistics For 2002

The Public Season at the Museum has again been a very busy one, and we have had interesting visitors from near and far. Visitors who left their signatures in our guest register came from at least 16 foreign countries and 38 different states. The countries included Australia, Germany, England, Peru, Turkmenistan, Malaysia, India, Finland, Zimbabwe, Brazil, Canada, and both the Czech and the Slovak Republics. The total number of visitors from the first of January through the first week of October was a total of 10,228.
